

**ELK TOWNSHIP
COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES
April 2, 2015**

The Regular Meeting of the Elk Township Committee was held on the above date in the Municipal Building. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Marchei at 7:30PM.

The Open Public Meeting Notice was read. The Salute to the Flag and the Lord's Prayer were recited in unison.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES of March 17, 2015 Work Session

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Ms. Yenner reported recreation held their annual Easter Egg Hunt, it was well attended despite the cold weather. Ms. Yenner thanked Aura Home and School for the refreshments and Rambo farms for the hay rides. The next recreation meeting will be on Tuesday, April 14th, everyone is welcome.

Mrs. Sammons stated the JIF meetings are being attended regularly and there is nothing to report. Environmental will be meeting Wednesday, April 8th and everyone is welcome to attend.

Mr. Marchei asked if the fire departments are up to date with their JIF safety reports. Mrs. Sammons stated the reports are now given to Mrs. Pine who sends them to Mr. Strout, safety coordinator. Mrs. Pine stated Ferrell Fire Company is up to date, and was not sure about Aura, and Lawn's has not submitted anything for 2015. She has been in contact with the companies.

Mr. Rambo reported the public works department has made it through the winter with repairing equipment and is now getting ready for spring. Dave Alexander has rebuilt one of the lawn mowers and it is running great. The 2 culverts on Railroad Avenue have been replaced, the work was complete as of Monday.

An estimate of \$800 was received from Joe Laux to re-grade Haynicz Road.

There is a lot of work coming up with the breaking of the weather, roads need to be repaired, trees need to be trimmed and the roadways will need to mowed, along with the mowing of the fields and municipal complex. Mr. Rambo would like to bring the current part-time employee on as full-time.

TOPICS:

Swanson driveway on Stanger Ave., Ms. Yenner asked Mrs. Sammons if there is anything to report. Mrs. Sammons stated a letter was received from Mr. Bitgood and it was discussed the contractor is waiting for good weather.

Mr. Bitgood continues to put pressure on the developer of Valle del Sol to make the repairs. The bond company has also been contacted and put on notice and the developer is aware of the contact with the bond company. The repairs are to be completed as soon as weather permits. Mr. Bitgood does not believe the developer can be relied on to finish the project.

Haynicz Road was moved upon earlier in the meeting.

Discussion ensued concerning tractor trailers parking on residential streets, the 4 ton weight limit on certain township roads and the noise created by trucks and refrigerator trucks.

Mayor Marchei stated the ordinance for no parking on roads is for between 2am-6am.

Ms. Yenner stated the police should be able to address the trucks parked on the road. She is also concerned with the possibility of retribution to the residents that complain about the trucks.

Mayor Marchei has spoken to Chief DeFalco about the trucks and he will be sending out a letter to the trucking company to request a meeting with the police to discuss the issues.

The noise ordinance is enforced by the police.

Mr. Alice stated the state law for noise at your property line is 65 decibels during the day and 55 during the evening.

If a resident has a complaint they need to contact the police. Ms. Yenner stated as a resident in the area there is an issue with the possibility of retribution with complaints. Especially when it is evident to the police at 3am there is a truck parked on the road. The roads are being torn up by the trucks.

Mrs. Sammons stated there are tractor trailer trucks that park on vacant land at the end of Union St.

Mr. Bitgood would like to request the ordinance review committee to consider parking restrictions in certain areas, particularly where there are drainage systems that require recharge from the surface.

Mr. Bitgood will get a list of the areas.

Mr. Rambo was asked to bring back something from the police and zoning officer to the next meeting.

Ms. Yenner wanted to know where the township stands with a shared service in regards to trash pick up. Mr. Alice has the existing contract for solid waste. He mentioned it was just in the news that Logan will be collecting trash for East Greenwich and Wenonah. He needs to get the cost per house that is currently being charged to the township. He will reach out to Logan Township.

GLOUCESTER COUNTY REPRESENTATIVE: David Lubelski contacted Mrs. Pine to notify that the county representative will not be able to attend the meeting this evening. He will be in his office on Monday, April 6th if there are any questions or concerns.

PUBLIC PORTION:

Motion by Ms. Yenner to open the meeting to the public, seconded by Mrs. Sammons, all were in favor, motion carried.

Mayor Marchei asked if anyone had any questions or comments or an issue they would like to bring to the township committees attention to come forward at this time.

Dr. Piera Gravenor, Superintendent of Elk Township and Delsea Regional Schools. She is here tonight to update committee on the happenings at the schools. The school appreciates, liaison, Mr. Poisker attending their meetings. It is budget time and both schools are getting ready to introduce their budgets. They will be coming in under the mandated 2%. The school was evaluated by the state for quality control. They passed with flying colors. The 4th, 5th and 6th grade students all have chrome books using a flip model. The PARQ testing has completed the first round at both Aura and Delsea. There were some parents that did not want their children to participate. The state raised the assessment standards in 2010 and a test has to be given to test the assessment. With the technology available in Aura there was no problem.

The Delsea bond that was approved in the fall, the first portion of the construction, the middle school roof and HVAC was awarded. The contract came in \$700,000 under budget.

Dr. Gravenor thanked committee and will be attending meetings periodically.

Dan Haynicz, 1092 Elk Rd., has heard they will be repaving Delsea Drive. He would like to know if millings can be placed on Haynicz Rd. Mr. Bitgood explained that using millings on roads is not allowed.

Mr. Haynicz also recalls there being a strict policy against the parking of trucks in residential areas.

He also asked about the use of jake brakes. The county will be contacted.

Mr. Haynicz thanked committee for taking care of Haynicz Rd.

Ashley Foster, 209 Daisey Avenue, moved into her home in 2010. There is a small piece of property behind her home, Block 214 Lot 7, and asked if there is a chance of this property being built upon. She was told by the zoning officer that the property could not be built on. There have been surveyors on the property. She does not feel it is fair that she purchased her property with the understanding that the property behind her could not be built on.

The zoning officer was not aware of an existing variance on the property, and that it fell under the permit extension act. Mr. Alice stated she should have done further research before she purchased her property.

Mr. Bitgood stated that there is no level of disclosure that needs to be provided to the adjacent property owners if they are going to be building. During the process to obtain the variance the neighbors were more than likely notified of the proceedings.

Motion by Mr. Rambo to close the public portion, seconded by Ms. Yenner, all were in favor, motion carried.

ENGINEER REPORT:

Mr. Bitgood stated there are not a whole lot of changes, Aura construction continues on the 3 model homes. The Vineyards at Silver Lake Estates, no work due to weather, there was a complaint about gypsy moths in a tree that they thought was in the township right of way, from a resident. The state has suspended the gypsy moth program. The home owner was notified.

The new CDBG maps have been released and there is a much larger area in Elk Township. CDBG grant money can be used to pave roadways. Mr. Bitgood would like committee to adopt a resolution at the next meeting in support of applying for grant. He will get a list together of suggested projects.

ORDINANCE O – 1 – 2015

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ELK,
COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER, STATE OF NEW JERSEY.

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING CHAPTER 40A ENTITLED “ALARM SYSTEMS” OF THE CODE OF
THE TOWNSHIP OF ELK

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Elk in the County of Gloucester and State of New Jersey as follows:

1. The “Code of the Township of Elk” is hereby amended so as to repeal the existing Chapter 40A entitled “Alarm Systems” and replace it with the following:

Section 1.

§ 40A-1. Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to establish regulation concerning the operation and maintenance of alarm systems within the Township of Elk and to provide penalties upon conviction for violation of any of the provisions set forth herein.

§ 40A-2. Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meaning indicated:

ALARM SYSTEM

Any mechanical, electrical or electronic device which is designed or used for the detection of an unauthorized entry into a building, structure or facility, or for alerting about the commission of an unlawful act within a building, structure or facility, or for alerting others about the existence of any other condition requiring response of police, fire or ambulance personnel; and which emits and/or transmits an audible and/or visual signal or message when actuated. Alarm systems include, but are not limited to, direct-dial telephone devices, audible alarms and subscriber alarms.

AUDIBLE ALARM

A device that emits an audible signal from the premises that it is designated to protect.

AUDIBLE CUTOFF

An electronic or mechanical device designed to cut off the audible sounding device on the premises after 15 minutes.

DIRECT-DIAL ALARM

A device which, when actuated, causes a recorded message to be transmitted, via telephone, to the Elk Township Police Department and/or Gloucester County Communications Center, stating that emergency response is necessary.

FALSE ALARM

An alarm signal necessitating response by the Elk Township Police Department or Fire Department where an emergency situation does not exist. An alarm which has been activated by an external source that is beyond the reasonable control of the subscriber shall not be considered a false alarm.

PERSON

Any natural person, firm, partnership, corporation or association.

POLICE

The Elk Township Police Department

SUBSCRIBER ALARM

An alarm system that is terminated by direct communication to the Elk Township Police Department and/or the Gloucester County Communications Center.

TOWNSHIP

The Township of Elk.

§ 40A-3. Registration Required.

- A. It shall be the responsibility of all persons that install, connect, operate or maintain an alarm system to first register such alarm system as hereinafter provided.
- B. Any person having installed, connected operated or maintained an alarm system prior to the effective date of this chapter shall be bound by the provisions hereof.

§ 40A-4. Registration procedure; fees.

- A. Alarm system registration shall be made upon initial installation on an application form provided by the Township Clerk of the Township of Elk. Said Application form shall require:
 - 1. Name, address and telephone number of the registrant.
 - 2. Lot, block and geographic location.
 - 3. The address of the protected premises wherein the alarm is located.
 - 4. The names, addresses and telephone numbers of at least two persons other than the registrant who may be contact in the event of the alarm.
 - 5. The service telephone number of the dialer alarm company which installed the unit.
 - 6. Audible alarm cutoff time.
 - 7. Such other information as may be required by the Township of Elk.
- B. A permit fee as set forth in § 54-2, Construction Code, Uniform Fees.
- C. Any person, firm or corporation in the business of installing alarm systems in the Township of Elk shall inform potential customers of the provisions of Chapter 40A of the Elk Township Code.

§ 40A-5. Conditions of registration.

It shall be the responsibility of all persons that own, operate and/or maintain alarm systems within the Township of Elk to provide current information to the office of the Clerk, consisting of the names and telephone numbers of responsible persons who may be contacted in case of emergency, or who are authorized to provide service to the alarm system; either must be on a twenty-four-hour basis. The Elk Township Clerk will forward this information to the Elk Township Police Department.

§ 40A-6. Deactivation of audible alarm.

All audible alarm systems must be silenced within 15 minutes after a designated responsible person is notified to do so by the Police and/or Fire Department. The alarm system shall be equipped with a timing device that will automatically silence the audible alarm within 15 minutes after it is actuated.

§ 40A-7. Training

It shall be the responsibility of all persons that maintain alarm systems within the Township of Elk to prevent the transmission of false alarms through a program of training and periodic inspection and maintenance of the system.

§ 40A-8. False alarms.

- A. The registrant shall maintain his equipment in good condition and repair so as to prevent false alarms. For the purposes of this section, false alarms activated by an act of God or other circumstance beyond the control of the registrant shall not be evidence of failure to properly maintain equipment.
- B. The maximum permissible number of false alarms for any one location shall be as follows:
 - 1. One false alarm in any ninety-day period; or
 - 2. Four false alarms in any one-year period.
- C. False alarms in excess of these standards shall be considered to be in violation of this chapter.

§ 40A-9. Exceptions.

The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to the general alerting alarms that may be utilized by fire companies, ambulance squads or civil defense agencies to summon response of their members. The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to alarm systems that are affixed to motor vehicles.

§ 40A-10. Violations and penalties.

- A. Any owner, resident or occupant, including but not limited to a residence, home, business, apartment, mobile home or the like, wherein the alarm system is connected, placed or maintained, who has not registered such system shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not less than \$250 nor more than \$500.
- B. Any person, entity, firm or corporation that is found guilty of violating any other section of this chapter shall be subject to the following penalties:
 - 1. For the first false alarm, a warning shall be issued.
 - 2. For a second false alarm in the same ninety-day period, a fine of \$250 shall be paid to Elk Township.
 - 3. For a third and subsequent false alarm within the same ninety day period, a fine of up to \$750 shall be paid to Elk Township.
 - 4. Upon conviction of a violation of this chapter for the fourth time in any twelve-month period and in addition to any penalty that may be ordered by the court, the Chief of Police may authorize the disconnection of alarms from the Gloucester County Communication Center after giving written notice to the subscriber, at least 10 days in advance, of his intention to disconnect same. The address for notification shall be by regular mail at the registration address submitted to the Township Clerk of the Township of Elk.

Section 2.

Repealer.

All prior Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistencies.

Section 3.

Severability.

Should any section, clause, sentence, phrase or provision of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 4.

When effective.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication in accordance with law.



Section 1.

Chapter 3 entitled “**Assessors, Board of**” shall be deleted in its entirety.

Section 2.

Repealer.

All prior Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistencies.

Section 3.

Severability.

Should any section, clause, sentence, phrase or provision of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 4.

When effective.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication in accordance with law.

ORDINANCE O – 3 – 2015

ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE
TOWNSHIP OF ELK AMENDING CHAPTER 54 SECTION 2 OF THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ELK ENTITLED
“UNIFORM CONSTRUCTION CODE”

WHEREAS, Township of Elk wishes to amend its Uniform Construction Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Elk, County of Gloucester, State of New Jersey, that Chapter 54, section 2 is hereby deleted and replaced with the following:

The basic construction permit fee shall be the sum of the parts computed on the basis of the parts or cost of construction, the number of plumbing fixtures and pieces of equipment, the number of electrical fixtures and the rating of electrical devices, the number of sprinklers, standpipes and detectors (smoke and heat) at the unit rates and/or the applicable flat fees as provided herein plus any special fees.

A. The fee for plan review shall be 20 percent of the amount to be charged for a construction permit.

(1) The fee for plan review of elevator devices in structures of groups other than R-3, R-4 or R-5 and for elevator devices wholly within dwelling units in structures of group R-2 shall be \$70.00 for each device.

(2) The fee for plan review for elevator devices in structures of groups other than R-3, R-4 or R-5 and devices in structures of group R-2 exempted by (1.a.) above shall be \$365.00 for each device.

B. Building subcode fees:

(1) Fees for new construction shall be based upon the volume of the structure. Volume shall be computed in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:23-2.28. In each case, the minimum fee shall be \$70.00 except for Use Groups A-1, A-2, A-3, A-4, E, F and S, where the minimum fee shall be \$170.00.

(a) The fee for new construction shall be in the amount of \$0.038 per cubic feet of volume for buildings and structures of all use groups and types of construction as classified and defined in articles 3 and 4 of the building subcode; except:

[1] Garden Type Sheds and similar uses, accessory to 1 & 2 family dwellings shall be as follows:

101 -200 square feet.....\$70.00
201 square feet and over.....\$125.00

[2] Open Deck Structures shall be as follows:

Under 100 square feet.....\$70.00
101 to 200 square feet.....\$125.00
201 to 400 square feet.....\$175.00
Over 400 square feet.....\$225.00

(b) For use groups A-1 thru A-5, F-1 & F-2, and S-1&2 the fee shall be \$.021 per cubic feet of volume; and

(c) For farms including commercial farm buildings as defined under N.J.A.C. 5:23-3.2(d), the fee shall be \$0.0011 per cubic feet of volume not to exceed a maximum fee of \$1,602.00.

(d) Fees for Modular homes shall be a flat fee of \$600.00. This includes footings and foundations for placement of the structure. Any other construction that is not part of the modular home, i.e. garage, deck or added room shall be charged at the rate for new construction.

(e) The fees for manufactured homes shall be a flat fee of \$300.00. This includes footings and foundations for placement of the structure. Any other construction that is not part of the modular home, i.e. garage, deck or added room shall be charged at the rate for new construction.

(2) Fees for renovations, alterations and repairs or site construction associated with pre-engineered systems of commercial farm buildings, pre-manufactured construction, and the external utility connection for pre-manufactured construction shall be based upon the estimated cost of work. The minimum fee shall be \$70.00.

(a) The fee shall be in the amount of \$34.00 per \$1,000.00 up to \$50,000. From \$50,001 to and including \$100,000, the additional fee shall be in the amount of \$26.00 per thousand of estimated cost above \$50,000 to \$100,000. \$100,001 and above, the additional fee shall be \$22.00 per \$1,000.

(b) For the purpose of determining estimated cost, the applicant shall submit to the enforcing agency such cost data as may be available, produced by the design professional or record, or by a recognized estimating firm, or by the contractor. A bonafide contractor's bid, if available, shall be submitted. The enforcing agency shall make the final decision regarding estimated cost.

[1] Fees for additions shall be computed on the same basis as for new construction for the added portion provided in each case, there shall be a minimum fee of \$70.00.

[2] Fees for the combination renovations and additions shall be computed as the sum of the fees computed separately in accordance with this Section with a minimum fee of \$70.00.

[3] The fee for tents, in excess of 900 SF or more than 30 feet on any dimension, shall be \$129.00.

[4] The fee for roofing or siding work shall be \$34.00 for each \$1,000.00 of estimated cost with a minimum of \$70.00. On structures of group R-3 or R-5 the fee shall be \$24.00 per \$1000.00.

[5] The fee for above-ground swimming pools shall be \$140.00 for a pool with a surface greater than 550 SF and \$70.00 for all smaller pools, hot tubs and spas.

The fee for an in-ground swimming pool with a surface area greater than 550 SF shall be \$210.00. All others shall be \$106.00.

[6] The fee for retaining walls shall be as follows:

i. The fee for a retaining with a surface area greater than 550 square feet that is associated with a Class 3 residential structure shall be \$210.00.

ii. The fee for a retaining wall with a surface area 550 square feet or less that is associated with a Class 3 residential structure shall be \$106.00.

iii. The fee for a newly constructed retaining wall of any size at other than a Class 3 residential structure shall be based on the cost of the construction. Minimum fee \$70.00

[7] The fee for elevator tests and inspections shall be N.J.A.C. 5:23-12.

(3) Fees for demolition:

(a) In-ground pool \$70.00

(b) Storage tanks: Use groups R-3 or R-5, \$65.00, all others \$92.00.

(c) Structures less than 5,000 SF and less than 30 feet in height shall be a flat fee of \$92.00 for group R-3 & R-5 and structures on farms including commercial farm buildings under N.J.A.C. 5:23-3.2(d). The fee will be \$168.00 for all other groups.

C. Plumbing subcode fees: Plumbing fixtures and equipment with the minimum permit fee being \$65.00 shall be as follows:

(1) The fee shall be \$15.00 per fixture, stack, piece of equipment or appliance connected to the plumbing system and for each appliance connected to the gas piping or oil piping system, sump pumps except as indicated below.

(2) The fee shall be \$91.00 per special device for the following:

(a) Grease traps

(b) Oil separators

(c) Refrigeration units

(d) Utility service connections

(d) Back flow preventers equipped with test ports (double check valve assembly, reduced pressure zone and pressure vacuum breaker backflow preventers)

(e) Steam boilers

(f) Hot water boilers (excluding those used for domestic water heating).

(g) Active solar systems

(h) Jacuzzi

(i) Sewer pumps and interceptors

(j) LP underground gas lines and tanks

(k) Air Conditioning Unit

(l) Soda dispensing and coffee machines

(m) Acid neutralizing devices

(n) Gas piping (new service)

(o) R-3 and R-5: Vacuum breakers and backflow preventers

(p) Well and septic connections

(3) For cross connections and back flow preventers that are subject to testing, requiring inspection annually the fee shall be \$58.00 for each device when they are tested.

- (4) For Heating system conversion units on existing heating appliances (oil to gas) the fee shall be \$15.00 per conversion unit.

D. Electrical subcode fees: The fee for electrical fixtures and devices, with a minimum fee of \$70.00 shall be as follows:

- (1) For the first block consisting of one to fifty receptacles, fixtures or devices, the fee shall be \$50.00; for each additional block consisting of up to twenty-five receptacles, fixtures or devices, the fee shall be \$9.00. For the purpose of computing this fee, receptacles, fixtures or devices shall include lighting fixtures, wall switches, convenience receptacles, sensors, dimmers, alarm devices, smoke and heat detectors, communications outlets, light standards eight feet or less in height including luminaries, emergency lights, electric signs, exit lights or similar electric fixtures and devices rated 20 amperes or less including motors or equipment rated less than one horsepower (hp) or one kilowatt (kw).

- (2) Light Standards (mogul base, mercury base or fixtures other than those specified in the previous subsection); For one to five fixtures, \$70.00; For each additional lamp, \$15.00

- (3) For each motor or electrical device rated from 1 hp or kw to 10 hp or kw; for each transformer or transformer rated from 1 kw or 1 kva to 10 kw or 10 kva; for each replacement of wiring involving one branch circuit or part thereof; for each storable pool or hydro massage bathtub; for each underwater lighting fixture; for each household electric cooking equipment rated up to 16 kw; for each fire, security or burglar alarm control unit; for each receptacle rated from 30 amps to 50 amps; for each light standard greater than eight feet in height including luminaries; and for each communications closet, the fee shall be \$15.00.

- (4) For each motor or electrical device rated from greater than 11 hp or 11 kw to 50 hp or kw; for each service equipment, panel board, switch gear, motor-controlled-center or disconnecting means rated 225 amps or less; for each transformer or generator rated from greater than 10 kw or 10 kva to 45 kw or 45 kva; for each electric sign rated from greater than 20 amps to 225 amps including associated disconnecting means; for each receptacle rated for greater than 50 amps; for each utility lead management device, the fee shall be \$65.00.

- (5) For each motor or electrical device rated from greater than 50 hp or 50 kw to 100 hp or 100 kw; for each service equipment, panel board, switch board, switch gear, motor-controlled-center or disconnecting means rated from greater than 225 amps to 1000 amps; for each transformer or generator rated from greater than 45 kw or 45 kva to 112.5 kw or 112.5 kva, the fee shall be \$129.00.

- (6) For each motor or electrical device rated greater than 100 hp or 100 kw; for each service equipment, panel board, switch board, switch board, switch gear, motor-controlled-center, or disconnecting means rated greater than 1000 amps; for each transformer or generator rated greater than 112.5 kw or 112.5 kva, the fee shall be \$640.00.

- (7) The fee charged for electrical work for each permanently installed private swimming pool as defined in the Building subcode, spa, hot tub or fountain shall be flat fee of \$77.00 which shall include any required bonding and associated equipment such as filter pumps, motors, disconnecting means, switches, required receptacles, heaters, etc. excepting panel boards and underwater lighting fixtures. For public swimming pools, the fee shall be changed on the basis of the number of electrical fixtures and rating of electrical devices in accordance with [D (1) through (6) above].

(8) The fee charged for single and multiple station smoke and/or heat detectors and fire, burglar or security alarm systems in any one or two family dwelling shall be a flat fee of \$65.00 per dwelling unit. For fire, burglar and security alarm systems and detectors in buildings other than one and two family dwellings, the fee shall be in accordance with [D (1) through (3) above].

(9) For installations consisting of multimeter stacks, the fee shall be based on ampere rating of the main buss and not upon the number of meters or rating of disconnects on the meter stack. Individual load side panel boards shall be charged in accordance with [D (4), (5) or (6) above]. There shall be no additional fee charged for the concurrent installation of individual feeder conductors.

(10) For motors or similar devices requiring concurrent installation of individual controls, relays and switches, the fee shall be based only upon the rating of the motor or device. There shall not be an additional fee charged for the concurrent installation of individual circuit components, for example, controllers, starters and disconnecting means.

(11) For electrical requiring replacement of service entrance conductors or feeder conductors only, the fee shall be based on the designated ampere rating of the overcurrent device of the service or feeder as follows:

- (A) 225 amperes or less, the fee shall be \$65.00
- (B) 226 to 1000 amperes, the fee shall be \$129.00
- (C) Greater than 1000 amperes, the fee shall be \$640.00

(12) The fee charged for process equipment shall be based on the ampere rating of the over current device protecting the conductor feeding the process equipment or the cutoff device.

(13) For the purpose of computing fees, all electrical and communication devices, utilization equipment and motors which are not part of premises wiring, except those which are portable plug-in type, shall be counted.

(14) For photovoltaic systems, the shall be based on the kilowatt rating of the Solar voltaic system as follows:

- (A) One to fifty kilowatt PV System Array, the fee shall be \$65.00.**
- (B) Fifty-one to 100 kilowatt PV System Array, the fee shall be \$129.00.**
- (C) Greater that 100 kilowatt PV System Array, the fee shall be \$640.00.**

** Charged as a "Communication Point"

(15) Inverters; Listed under "Amp Motor Control Center/Inverter"

- (A) Up to 200 amp the fee shall be \$65.00
- (B) Up to 1000 amp the fee shall be \$129.00
- (C) Over 1000 amp the fee shall be \$640.00

(16) Disconnects: Listed under "Amp Motor Control/Disconnects"

- (A) Up to 200 amp the fee shall be \$65.00
- (B) Up to 1000 amp the fee shall be \$129.00
- (C) Over 1000 amp the fee shall be \$640.00

(17) Annual fee for inspection of Commercial Pools, spas and hot tubs [NJAC 5:23-2.18C] shall be \$100.00.

E. Fire Protection Subcode Fees: For fire protection and hazardous equipment, sprinklers, standpipes, detectors (smoke and heat), pre-engineered suppression systems, gas and oil fired appliances not connected to the plumbing system, kitchen exhaust systems, incinerators and crematoriums. With minimum permit fee of \$70.00, the fee shall be as follows:

- (1) Sprinklers: The fee for twenty or fewer heads shall be \$91.00; 21 heads to and including 100 heads, the fee shall be \$168.00; 101 heads to and including 200 heads, the fee shall be \$321.00; 201 heads to and including 400 heads, the fee shall be \$831.00; 401 heads to and including 1,000 heads, the fee shall be \$1,150.00; 1001 heads and above, the fee shall be \$1,469.00
- (2) Smoke Detectors: The fee for 1 to 12 detectors shall be \$50.00; 13 to and including 37 detectors shall be \$67.00; 38 to and including 62 detectors shall be \$84.00; 63 to and including 87 detectors shall be \$101.00; 88 to and including 112 detectors shall be \$118.00; 113 to and including 137 detectors shall be \$135.00; 138 detectors and over shall be \$152.00
- (3) The fee for each standpipe shall be \$321.00.
- (4) The fee for each independent pre-engineered system shall be \$129.00.
- (5) The fee for each gas or oil fired appliance that is not connected to the plumbing system shall be \$65.00 per appliance.
- (6) The fee for installation of above ground oil tank shall be \$58.00.
- (7) The fee for each commercial kitchen exhaust system shall be \$150.00.
- (8) The fee for each incinerator shall be \$511.00.
- (9) The fee for each crematorium shall be \$511.00.
- (10) The fee for Fire Pumps shall be \$180.00 ea.
- (11) Gasoline and Propane Tanks: the fee shall be \$70.00 each for the installation of above and in ground tanks.
- (12) The fee for Supervisory Devices (i.e. tampers high/low air) shall be \$15.00 each.
- (13) The fee for Signaling Devices (i.e. horn/strobes, bells) shall be \$15.00 each.
- (14) Dry Pipe Alarm & Pre-Action valves: the fee shall be \$60.00 each.
- (15) Smoke Control System: the fee shall be \$60.00 each.

(16) Permits for the installation of fireplaces, woodstoves and solid fuel burning appliances shall be \$34.00 per \$1,000.00 of estimated cost per unit, stove or fireplace with a minimum fee of \$70.00 per appliance or device.

(17) Fireplace Venting/Metal Chimney Liner: the fee shall be \$70.00 each.

(18) For single and multiple station smoke or heat detectors and fire alarm systems in any one or two family dwellings, there shall be a flat fee of \$33.00 per dwelling unit. For detectors and fire alarm systems in buildings other than one or two family dwellings, the fee shall be charged in accordance with [5.a. (2) above].

F. Fees for Certificates and Other Permits are as Follows:

(1) The fee for demolition or removal permit shall be \$92.00 for a structure of less than 5,000 SF in area and less than 30' in height, for one or two family dwellings (R-3 / R-5 of the building subcode), structures on farms including commercial farm buildings under N.J.A.C. 5:23-3.2(d) and \$168.00 for all other groups.

(2) The fee for a permit to construct a sign shall be as follows:

i. The fee for pylon signs shall be \$6.00 per square foot for the first 100 square feet and \$4.75 per square foot for the next 400 square feet and \$3.50 per square foot thereafter;

ii. Fees for ground signs or wall signs shall be \$6.00 per square foot for the first 100 square feet, \$4.75 per square foot for the next 400 square feet and \$3.50 per square foot thereafter;

iii. The minimum fee shall be \$70.00.

(3) The fee for a certificate of occupancy shall be \$50.00.

(4) The fee for certificate of occupancy granted pursuant to a change of the use group shall be \$168.00.

(5) The fee for a certificate of continued occupancy issued under N.J.A.C. 5:23 shall be \$168.00.

(6) The fee for the first issuance and renewal of a temporary certificate of occupancy shall be \$39.00 and an additional fee of \$39.00 for each extension.

(7) The fee for plan review of a building or compliance under the alternate systems and nondepletable energy source provisions of the energy subcode shall be \$383.00 for one and two family dwellings (group R-3 or R-5 of the building subcode), and for light commercial structures having the indoor temperature controlled from a single point, and \$1,915.00 for all other structures.

(8) The fee for an application for a variation in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:23-2.10 shall be \$821.00 for class I structures and \$168.00 for class II or class III structures. The fee for resubmission of an application for a variation shall be \$321.00 for class I structures and \$91.00 for class II or class III structures.

(9) The fee for a permit for lead hazard abatement work shall be \$196.00. The fee for a lead abatement clearance certificate shall be \$39.00.

(10) Permits for the installation of fireplaces, woodstoves and solid fuel burning appliances shall be \$34.00 per \$1,000.00 of estimated cost per unit, stove or fireplace with a minimum fee of \$70.00 per appliance or device.

(11) A fee to erect a fence shall be \$15.00 per \$1,000.00 of estimated cost provided that in each case there shall be a minimum fee of \$70.00.

(12) Fee for re-instatement of expired construction permit shall be at the rate of 75% of the original permit fee. The fee is to be calculated with the use or current fee schedule, less 25% for reinstatement fees.

G. Mechanical Systems.

(1) Oil / Electric heat to gas heat

(a) Permits required:

- [1] Building
- [2] Electric
- [3] Plumbing
- [4] Fire
- [5] DCA

(2) Oil / Gas heat to heat pump

(b) Permits required:

- [1] Building
- [2] Electric
- [3] DCA

(3) Oil / Electric to propane

(1) Permits required:

- [1] Building
- [2] Plumbing
- [3] Fire
- [4] DCA

H. For cross connections and back flow preventers that are subject to testing, requiring inspection annually, the fee shall be \$58.00 for each device when they are tested.

I. Annual permit requirements are as follows: The fee that is charged for an annual construction permit shall be charged annually. The fee shall be a flat fee based upon the number of maintenance workers who are employed by the facility, and who are primarily engaged in work that is governed by a subcode. Managers, engineers, and clericals shall not be considered maintenance workers for the purpose of establishing the annual construction permit fee. Annual permits may be issued for building, fire protection, electrical and plumbing. Fees for annual permits shall be as follows:

(1) One to twenty-five workers (including foreman) \$933.00 per worker. Each additional worker over 25, \$329.00 per worker.

(2) Prior to the issuance of the annual permit, a training registration fee of \$196.00 per subcode and a list of not more than three individuals to be trained per subcode shall be submitted by the applicant to the Department of Community Affairs, Bureau of Code Services, Education Unit – along with a copy of the construction permit (Form F 170). Checks shall be made payable to “Treasurer, State of New Jersey”. The Department shall register these individuals and notify them of the Courses being offered.

J. The fees for elevator device inspections and tests shall be as set forth in N.J.A.C. 5:23-12.

K. The mechanical subcode permit in a structure of group R-3 or R-5 by a mechanical inspector shall be \$54.00 for the first device and \$13.00 for each additional device. No separate fee shall be charged for gas, fuel oil or water piping connections associated with the mechanical inspected.

L. The fee for the annual electrical inspection of commercial swimming pools, spas or hot tubs shall be \$100.00. The fee for each additional swimming pool, spa or hot tub on a site shall be \$50.

M. The fee for a permit for the removal of a building or structure from one lot to another or to a new location on the same lot shall be \$34.00 for each \$1,000 estimated cost for moving and placement in a completed condition at the new location, provided that there shall be a minimum fee of \$70.00. The new foundation shall be computed as for new construction.

N. For charitable, philanthropic, fraternal and religious organizations holding exempt status, the fee shall be 25% of the regular fees to cover the cost of plan review, inspections and administration.

O. For plans already reviewed, those plans processed as prototype, there will be a discount of Twenty percent (20%) of the construction permit. Said prototype plan approvals shall be valid for the purpose of applying for the new construction permit. When submitting under prototype plan review, the construction Code Official shall be notified.

P. The fee for a fish pond in R-3 or R-5 use group that meets the definition of a swimming pool shall be a flat fee of \$65.00.

Q. The municipality shall remit fees to the Bureau on a quarterly basis, in conjunction with report number R-840A, State Training Fee Report in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:23-4.5(d).

R. Waiver of construction permit fees for residential accessibility improvements. Pursuant to New Jersey Public Law 1996, Chapter 92 (N.J.A.C. 52:27D-126 e) disabled persons, as so defined, or a parent or sibling of a disabled person shall not be required to pay any municipal fee or charge in order to secure a construction permit for any construction, reconstruction, alteration or improvements which promotes accessibility to the disabled person’s living unit.

Section 3. PARTIAL INVALIDITY.

If any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part hereof.

Section 4. INCONSISTENT PROVISIONS

All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the Township of Elk heretofore adopted that are inconsistent with any of the terms and provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

Section 5. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final approval. Notice of adoption shall be published as provided by law.

ORDINANCE O – 4 – 2015

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ELK,
COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER, STATE OF NEW JERSEY.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 60 ENTITLED “ANIMAL CONTROL” OF THE CODE OF
THE TOWNSHIP OF ELK

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Committee of the Township of Elk have determined that certain amendments to Chapter 60 entitled “Animal Control” are necessary; and

WHEREAS, in all other respects, Chapter 60 entitled “Animal Control” shall remain in full force and effect.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Committee of the Township of Elk, in the County of Gloucester and State of New Jersey, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of same as follows:

Section 1.

Chapter 60 “Animal Control” shall be amended to read as follows:

§ 60-3. Licensing and vaccination requirements; exemptions.

D. Licensing and fees.

(1)(a) For altered or sterilized dogs: \$6. **\$10.**

(b) For nonaltered or nonsterilized dogs: \$9. **\$13**

(2) A late fee of \$10, in addition to the fees set forth above, shall be imposed upon an owner where a dog within the Township limits qualifying for a license on the first day of each year is not licensed ~~on or~~ before the 31st day of March **before the 1st day of March** of each calendar year.

Section 2.

Repealer.

All prior Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with this Ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistencies.

Section 3.

Severability.

Should any section, clause, sentence, phrase or provision of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 4.





RESOLUTION R-46-2015

RESOLUTION URGING TRANSPORTATION TRUST FUND REAUTHORIZATION AND INCREASED FUNDING FOR LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

WHEREAS, local officials know that investments in our rapidly deteriorating transportation infrastructure must be made, since failure to do so can compromise the safety of the public, the economic vitality of our communities and the security of our neighborhoods; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Transportation (DOT) reports that New Jersey's municipalities are responsible for 64 percent (28,539 center line road miles) of our roads, county governments are responsible for another 22 percent (6,649 center line road miles), and together, local governments are responsible for 39 percent of our bridges; and

WHEREAS, local roadways and bridges carry about 55 percent of all of New Jersey's traffic; and

WHEREAS, just last year, the American Society of Civil Engineers reported that 651 of the 6,554 bridges in New Jersey (9.9%) are considered structurally deficient and 1,717 (26.2%) are considered functionally obsolete, and that driving on roads in need of repair costs New Jersey motorists \$3.476 billion a year in extra vehicle repairs and operating costs – \$601 per motorist, and that 66% of New Jersey's roads are in poor or mediocre condition; and

WHEREAS, in the first year of the Transportation Trust Fund (FY 1985), Local Aid funding represented almost 22 % of total Transportation Capital funding, but over the years, the Local Aid portion was reduced to 16% in FY 1997, 12% in FY 2004, and 15% in FY 2013, so that the average Local Aid funding over the first 29 years of the Transportation Trust Fund was just under 15%, and

WHEREAS, the need for investments in local roads and bridges has not decreased since 1985, and no one has suggested that it will decrease in the future; and

WHEREAS, On May 1, New Jersey DOT then-Commissioner Jim Simpson announced that the State's Transportation Trust Fund is just 14 months away from a \$620 million deficit; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Township Committee of the Township of Elk, joins with the New Jersey League of Municipalities in supporting the "Forward New Jersey" coalition, and we call on State policy-makers to:

1. Reauthorize the Transportation Trust Fund to ensure adequate and reliable funding to meet State and local transportation infrastructure funding needs for the next 10 years;
2. Increase Local Aid funding to ensure adequate and reliable funding to meet all local transportation infrastructure needs; and
3. Increase the municipal share of Local Aid funding and ensure fair funding for all municipalities; and be it, further,

RESOLVED, that given the extent of the local infrastructure, and given the need for strong and steady investment in that infrastructure, we will call for assurances that Local Aid will represent, at a minimum, 25% of annual Transportation Capital spending, and for adjustments in funding, to account for the effects of inflation; and be it, finally,

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this Resolution be forwarded to Governor Chris Christie, Commissioner of the Department of Transportation Jamie Fox, State Senate President Stephen Sweeney, Assemblyman John Burzichelli and Assemblyman Adam J. Taliaferro, to all Gloucester County Municipalities and to the New Jersey League of Municipalities.




